Subject: Consideration & Selection of Three Latinas as part of CCRC

Dear California Citizens Redistricting Commission:

Hello, My name is Alejandra Arciniega. I am a resident of Los Angeles County and was raised in San Bernardino County. I attended CSULB and thank the public school system for helping me transition out of extreme poverty and into an upwardly mobile career. For me, it's important that we get representation from Latinas on the board, as an immigrant it's important that we have a shared lived experience. I would prefer women on the board and Latinas to represent me, our family and our community. We need someone who understands cultural nuances, not just studied them.

I am concerned that, to date, there are ZERO Latinx people represented among the eight sitting commissioners despite the fact that Latinx are the largest ethnic group in California, accounting for nearly 40% of the state's 40 million residents. Not only does this mean the largest Latinx population of any state is completely neglected in an entity designed to represent the most populous state in the nation, it also highlights that another essential voice is completely missing from the discussion and decision making process: a Latina voice.

Latinas in the state numbered 7.72 million, or 19.5% of California's total population in 2018. One in every five people in the state is a Latina. In the Fresno metropolitan region and the Inland Empire, one out of every four people was a Latina in 2018, and the Los Angeles metropolitan region is approaching the same ratio. It is projected Latinos will comprise 43% of California's population by 2030, increasing to 49% by 2060, with approximately half of those being Latina.

I strongly believe the absence of the Latina perspective will negatively impact the purpose of the Citizens Redistricting Commission and be detrimental in fulfilling its voter approved mandate to fairly represent the diversity of the vast state for the next decade.

I urge the 8 sitting members of the California Citizens Redistricting Commission to prioritize equity and representation by considering and selecting at minimum 3 Latinas to serve in the Commission's final 6 seats.
